To Omer Ayer. a constable in the Plantation of Coplin, in said County of Franklin: Greeting:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Plantation, qualified by law to vote in plantation affairs, to assemble at the School-house, in said Plantation, on the 6th day of March, 1933, at one o'clock in the afterneon, to act on the following abticles, to wit:

Art.1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Art.3. To see if the plantation will vote to accept the report of the municipal officers as printed.

Art.4. To choose all necessary plantation officers for the ensuing year.

Art.5. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the support of Common Schools for the ensuing year.

Art.6. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for High School tuition for the ensuing year.

Art.7. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for text-books and school supplies for the ensuing year.

Art.8. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for transporting scholars for the ensuing year.

Art9. To see if the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise money, and how much, for the county health nurse.

Art.10. To see what sum of miney the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise to pay plantation officers' bills for the ensuing year. Estimate \$475.90

Art.ll. to see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the maintenance of roads in summer for the ensuing year.

Estimate \$125.90

Art.12. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the maintenance of reads in winter for the ensuing year. Estimate \$225.00

Art.13. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the maintenance of fifty-fifty highway for the ensuing year. Estimate \$90.00

Art.14. To see what sum of money the plantation will vete to appropriate and raise to cut the bushes on State Aid Road, 3rd Class Road and Town Roads for the ensuing year. Estimate \$50.00

Art.15. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the maintenance of State Aid Highway Patrol for the ensuing year. Estimate \$190.00

Art.16. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the maintenance of Improved Sections of 3rd Class Highway. Estimate \$35.00

Art.17. To see what sum of money, if any, the plantation would recommend to take from the joint State aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State aid roads built within the past five years, in accordance with the previsions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

Art.18. To see if the plantation will vote yes or no the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the plantation to State aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

Art.19. To see what sum the plantation will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid read as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1931.

Estimate \$600.00.

Art.26. To see what sum of money the plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the abatement of taxes for the ensuing year.

Art.21. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

The Assessors give notice that they will be in session, for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at the Schoolhouse at 12.30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.

S. Committee Chairman Louise Savage Secretary R. L. Sinclair To the Members of the Superintending School Committee and Citizens of the Plantation of Coplin: I hereby submit, as required by law, the annual report of your school for the municipal year ending January 31, 1933.

Our school has had a very profitable year and marked advancement in their subjects has been evident in all our pupils. The first impression on entering the school is the quiet orderly way in which the pupils are attending to their work. Then as one listens to the recitations one can see that the pupils are not only reciting from the text but are using their own ideas of applying the text to the various problems of life as they have observed them. In other words we are developing thinkers, a class of people that are needed at this stage of the world's development. During the school year 1931-32 the average attendance was 8.7 from an enrollment of 9 pupils. I think this is a high water mark in attendance for Coplin and I am glad to state that the average attendance for the present school year to date is I doubt if this attendance even higher than that of last year. record is bettered by any school in the state. During the present session of the Legislature, a move was initiated to cut the interest on Reserve Lands for plantations. Under this act there was no guarantee that the plantation would receive any interest whatever. Our only hope was to kill it in the committee hearing and twelve men from this section attended this hearing and opposed the bill. Those from Coplin were E. L. Hinds, A. L. Savage, H. L. Tague and Elmer Blackwell. I wish to express my thanks to these men for their aid and I am glad to report that the bill failed to be recommended for passage. It meant a loss of from three to nine hundred dallage to Coplin sleep. Our State money will be cut 20% dred dollars to Coplin alone. during the coming year and that means somewhat larger appropriations by the plantation. We have already reduced the cost of the school somewhat and we can make other small reductions. Our high school tuition should be less next year also.
With all these things in mind I beg leave to submit the following recommendations. \$100.00 Common Schools High School Tuition 400.00 Conveyance Text Books and Supplies \$700.00 Total At this time I wish to express my deep appreciation of the the uniform courtesy and consideration I have received from the school officials, plantation officials and citizens in serving you in my present capacity. Report of Teacher

Coplin, Maine Feb. 24, 1933

To the Superintendent, School Committee and Citizens:
I submit the following report of the Coplin School for the
twenty-two weeks the school has been maintained, beginning September 6, 1932 and ending February 24, 1933.

The average attendance for this period is 9.89. Those who have been present every day for the past twenty-two weeks are the following: Eldora Bachelder, Harry Farrow, Joe Farrow and Sheridan Scribner. Parker Savage has only missed a half day; Junior Scribner, one day; Verne Scribner, one and one half days; Norma Savage, two days; Phyllis Bachelder, two days; and Harry Dyer, five days. There have been only two instances of tardiness.

Harry and Joe Farrow are tuition pupils from Lang plantation. I found the school in excellent condition due to the splendid

instruction of its previous teacher, Miss Georgie Wilbur.

We have completed the required amount of work in all branches
for the twenty-two weeks. In some cases we have completed more than the required amount which gives time for thorough and extensive review work. We are now using the Strayer-Upton Arithmetics from the fourth grade up, which makes the work uniform.

Mr. Sinclair has made his customary visits on the average of about one a week. The pupils are industrious and I do not have to urge them to work or to take their subjects home. They do so habitually.

The evening of November third we put on a patriotic program in commemoration of the two hundredth anxiversary of the birth of George Washington followed by a box social. We cleared seventeen dollars. The ladies of the community furnished and served coffee and cocoa to go with the boxes. I wish to express my appreciation to the ladies for their cooperation on this occasion. With the money obtained from the social, we paid for a croquet set, which was purchased in the fall, bought two packs of flinch cards for amusement on days we spent entirely indoors, and purchased "Current Events" for the school. We also paid two dollars for health seals.

We are issuing a monthly magazine which the pupils have named"The Coplin School Happy Tales". The best compositions written during the month and the school news are published.

We have organized "The Sunshine League". Meetings are held every two weeks and the programs are conducted by the pupils.

Mrs. Ruby Savage has been the only parent to observe our regular school work. We wish that more of the parents and friends would wight us. visit us.

It has been a pleasure to be the teacher of Coplin School where it is so easy for parents and the teacher to cooperate for the welfare of the children.

Report of Health Nurse To the Citizens of Coplin Plantation:

I hereby submit my fifth report as public Health Nurse for

the fiscal year ending February 1, 1933.

In the Spring, the students were reweighed and nine Seven
Point Pins and Certificates awarded to all the students, only a few schools being 100% correction.

In October, the Annual Routine Health Examination was given to 10 students, 2 were found with physical defects, 7 had corrections. As usual the schools were asked to participate in the Health

Parade held in Stratten.

The Nurse and the North Franklin County Public Health Committee again extend thanks to the teachers and others who have helped and co-operated with them in the Health work.
