To the members of the School Board and Parents and Citizens of Coplin:

RESERVE LAND INTEREST AMOUNTS TO \$1,073 ANNU-ALLY and can be used only for School Purposes. This must be carried forward from year to year in the Treasury if not spent. This money was obtained from the sale of Town timber and is forever for use of the children of the Plantation. It would not seem to be necessary to raise money for the School account.

200,000 teachers have left teaching since Pearl Harbor. There will only be about 25 graduate from the General course at Farmington this year. Inflation has occurred and living costs have risen 26 per cent. Flour is higher now than it was during the Civil War.

Owing to general conditions and the small number of scholars at present it was decided to close the School and convey the pupils to Stratton. If the War comes to a sudden end no doubt there will be an influx of pupils back into the Plantation. I hope all will write letters to the boys and girls in the Armed forces. The people of Coplin are friendly people and it has been a pleasure to work with them.

STATE OF MAINE

County of Franklin, ss.

To Omer Dyer, a Constable in the Plantation of Coplin, in the said County of Franklin,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Coplin Plantation, qualified to vote in the Plantation affairs, to assemble at the Schoolhouse in said Plantation on the sixth day of March, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the following articles, to wit:

- Article 1. To elect a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2. To elect a Clerk for the ensuing year.
- Art. 3. To see if the Plantation will accept the report of the Municipal Officers as printed.
- Art. 4. To elect all Necessary Plantation Officers for the ensuing year.
- Art. 5. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Elementary School Tuition for the ensuing year.
- Art. 6. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for High School Tuition for the ensuing year.
- Art. 7. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Conveyance of High and Common School pupils for the ensuing year.
- Art. 8. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the services of the Public Health Nurse.
- Art. 9. To see what sum of money the Plantation will appropriate and raise to pay Plantation Officers' Bills for the ensuing year. Estimate \$467.40.
- Art. 10. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Plantation Roads in Summer for the ensuing year.

- Art. 11. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Winter Roads and Snow Fence for the ensuing year. Estimate \$100.
- Art. 12. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Cutting Bushes for the ensuing year. Estimate \$70.
- Art. 13. To see if the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$34.00, the sum required by the State Highway Commission, for the maintenance of Improved Sections of the Third Class Highway, for the ensuing year.
- Art. 14. To see if the Plantation will appropriate and raise \$605.00 for the Summer and Winter maintenance of State Highway.
- Art. 15. To see if the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise \$40.50 for the maintenance of State Aid Highway for the ensuing year.
- Art. 16. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.
- Art. 17. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for the Discount on Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art. 18. To see what action the Plantation will take in regard to repairing or building a new Bridge across South Branch River.
- Art. 19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Assessors give notice that they will be in session at the School-house for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at 12:30 o'clock in the afternoon, on the day of said meeting.
