To the Members of the School Board and Parents and Citizens of Coplin:

This is a War Edition of the School report. Everyone is urged to buy all the bonds and stamps they can afford. The boys in the Service like to receive a lot of mail. We hope Victory will come soon and that a good job will be waiting for the boys when they come home.

Owing to the manpower and womanpower shortage there are no teachers available. War jobs at \$100 a week and low salaries for teachers and low pensions have all contributed to the shortage of teachers. Money will not buy any teachers at present. There are none.

Here in the Plantation there were so few scholars that it was decided to convey the pupils to Stratton. I have heard many comments on how well the pupils were enjoying their work at the Stratton Consolidated School.

THE RESERVE LAND INTEREST is a big help to the Town and it was obtained from the Sale of the Town timber. This money must be carried forward from year to year in the Town Treasury if not spent for Schools. It is forever for use of the Children of the Plantation. This Reserve Land Interest amounts to \$1,073 annually.

It has been a real pleasure to work with the kind, friendly people of Coplin.

## **Plantation Warrant**

STATE OF MAINE

COUNTY OF FRANKLIN, SS.

To Odell L. Dyer, a Constable in the Plantation of Coplin, in the said County of Franklin,

Greetings:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of Coplin Plantation, qualified to vote in the Plantation affairs, to assemble at the Schoolhouse in said Plantation on the fifth day of March, 1945, at one o'clock in the afternoon, to vote on the following articles, to wit:

- ARTICLE 1. To elect a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- ART. 2. To elect a clerk for the ensuing year.
- ART. 3. To see if the Plantation will vote to accept the report of the Municipal Officers as printed.
- ART. 4. To elect all necessary Plantation Officers for the ensuing year.
- ART. 5. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise to pay Plantation Officers' bills for the ensuing year. Estimate \$472.45
- ART. 6. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Elementary School tuition for the ensuing year. Estimate \$20.00
- ART. 7. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for High School tuition for the ensuing year. Estimate \$15.00

- ART. 8. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for services of the Public Health Nurse. They asked for \$20.00
- ART. 9. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Plantation roads in summer for the ensuing year.
- ART. 10. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for Plantation roads in winter and snow fence for the ensuing year.
- ART. 11. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for cutting bushes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 12. To see if the Plantation will vote to appropriate the sum of \$34.00, the amount required by the State Highway Comm. for maintenance of improved sections of the Third Class Highway, for the ensuing year.
- ART. 13. To see if the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$605.00 for the Summer and Winter maintenance of State Highway, for the ensuing year.
- ART. 14. To see if the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$40.50 for the maintenance of State Aid Highway for the ensuing year.
- ART. 15. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for State Aid Road construction (in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Chapter 213, Public Laws of 1941.
- ART. 16. To see whether or not the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$25.00 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.

- ART. 17. To see what action the Plantation will take in regard to having the yards plowed for next year.
- ART. 18. To see what sum of money the Plantation will vote to appropriate and raise for discount on taxes for the ensuing year.
- ART. 19. To see if the Plantation will appropriate and raise a sum of money, and how much, to be used for road building after the war.
- ART. 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

The Assessors give notice that they will be in session at the Schoolhouse for the purpose of revising and correcting the list of voters, at 12:30 o'clock in the afternoon on the day of said meeting.
